Medicare is the federal health insurance program for people who are 65 or older, certain younger people with disabilities, and people with end-stage renal disease. Medicare has four parts: A, B, C, and D. Part A covers hospital costs when admitted, Part B covers physician visits and outpatient services, Part C offers Medicare Advantage plans through local private plans, and Part D helps pay prescription drug costs. Medicaid Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) provide free or low-cost health coverage to millions of Americans, including low-income people, families, children, pregnant women, the elderly, and people with disabilities. Medicaid managed care provides health benefits and additional services through arrangements between state Medicaid agencies and managed care organizations. Premiums are monthly payments for coverage, not medical services. Deductibles are amounts paid before insurance kicks in. Co-insurance and co-pays apply after deductibles. Out-of-pocket maximums limit annual expenses. Health insurance plans have different requirements for coverage. Staying in network usually provides lower costs, but may require referrals for procedures and specialists. Common plan types include Health Maintenance Organization (HMO), Preferred Provider Organization (PPO), Point of Service (POS), Exclusive Provider Organization (EPO).
